### SPEAKER: Margaret Scott Owner, Savage's Bakery



Margaret Scott grew up in Birmingham and as a child worked in the family bakery, helping out after school, in the summers, and over holidays. Her father, Vann Scott, bought Savage's Bakery in 1978 after the owner, William Savage passed away. His background included in-the-trenches training at Waite's Bakery, a long-time Birmingham favorite that has since closed. In the meantime, his daughter, Margaret, graduated from Mountain Brook High School and obtained a degree in managerial finance from the University of Mississippi. After working a few years at a ski resort in Jackson Hole, WY, Margaret returned to Birmingham and joined her father in the family business - Savage's Bakery. She works with her father daily and occasionally gets to be the boss - a role reversal that she enjoys immensely. Margaret handles the bakery's bookkeeping, trains new employees, and tends to myriad other details that keep the business running smoothly. She has also helped oversee redecorating efforts and is responsible for the addition of many new and delicious items to the deli-style menu. The Scotts want to continue to build the business yet stay true to their history while planning for the success of the next generation. They remain committed to its customers and promise many new and exciting additions to the already thriving business.

3) Offer new member orientation. Build new members understanding of Rotary by hosting a series of information sessions. Suggested topics include Rotary history, opportunities for service, and The Rotary Foundation.

4) Encourage new and existing members to stay current using the many Rotary resources available. Courses found in the Rotary International Learning Center along with informational webinars make it easy to learn at your own pace.

### The Object of Rotary

**THE OBJECT** of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

**FIRST** The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

**SECOND** High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

**THIRD** The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

**FOURTH** The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

### Rotarian Code of Conduct

The following code of conduct has been adopted for the use of Rotarians: **AS A ROTARIAN**, I will:

- 1) Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life.
- 2) Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect.
- 3) Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world.
- 4) Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians.

## ROTARY TRADITIONS

One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at "make up" meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events. The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs which participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they be distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. It is recommended that banners include pictures, slogans or designs which portray the territorial area of the club. The board was also mindful of the financial burden such exchanges may impose upon some clubs, especially in popular areas where many visitors make up and request to exchange. In all instances, clubs are cautioned to exercise discretion and moderation in the exchange of banners in order that the financial obligations do not interfere with the basic service activities of the club. Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as a tangible symbol of our international fellowship.
